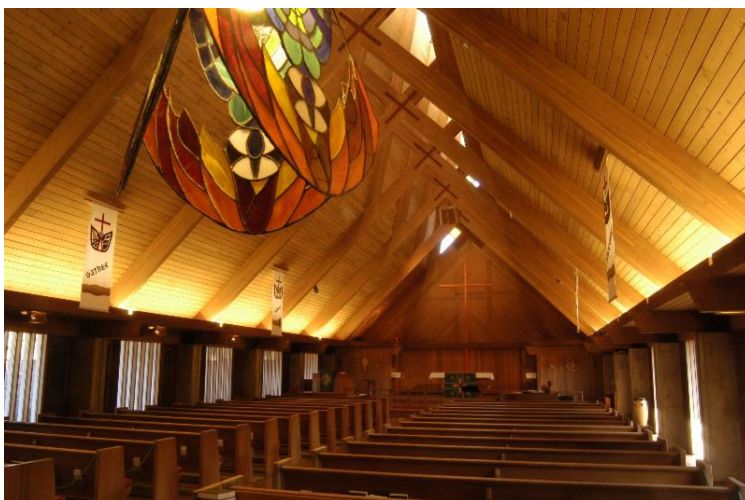

We have had a precious time of Lent leading up to The Three Days, culminating in the great Resurrection. How blessed we are as a church that we were able to see all kinds of diversity: liturgical diversity through Holden Evening Prayer, Taize, Tenebrae, Stations of the Cross, African American Spirituals, Western traditional, African traditional, modern "contemporary"; generational diversity - young adults to retirees singing, playing music or leading liturgy together; racial diversity - people with identities span many parts of Europe, Africa, South America, Asia and North America. On Wednesdays during Lent we collaborated as two Evangelical Lutheran Churches (ELCA) sharing Soup and Worship, literally moving back and forth between our physical locations - Gethsemane (GLC) and University (UELCA).

I want to believe that through this time, all of this was led by the Holy Spirit, as we were prepared to submit to the Spirit's work amongst us. I pray that we continue to follow where God leads. I pray that we continue to make the time to pray, stay connected to the Lord and to each other in that same spirit. THIS is revitalisation (formerly called "redevelopment") for the ELCA in Gainesville, FL.

This is where - even though it was the path through the pain and passion of Christ to the Cross - we have seen the Risen Christ amongst us. When we share the good news about the Risen Christ, and people seem to ask, "Where is Christ risen?", we can share the Jesus Story amongst us.

The resurrection needs to be real and palpable for us, so that we can tell that story to the world we are charged to reach with the Gospel. No matter whether they are drawn to this Jesus or mock Him... He will continue to rise again in us!

This season of Easter, let's tell that story, although, being careful to not stop asking of ourselves first, "Where is Christ risen in my life?"

Participants reflected on how what we learned could influence our church's redevelopment moving forward.

Sam Borgert is leading a project to provide wood laminate flooring in the Kaiser Center, including the offices, within the next few months. The project is will not include the educational wing. It is being paid for by funds in the Campus Ministry bank balance.

Thanks to Andy Finn and the Pastor the sound system is working much more consistently.

Also funded by the Campus Ministry bank balance is the Kaiser Center lighting project. Martin Vala has installed LED lights in the main room in the Kaiser Center to provide a brighter environment and a more lighting efficient system. He is installing LED lighting in the conference room and library. He also will put two "spots" in the two hanging fixtures in the darker part of the main Kaiser Center room next to the offices.

Martin is also removing the old sign in the front of the church and should have the new sign installed in the first half of April.

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The church Council is working on revisions to the church constitution, particularly revisions mandated by the Florida-Bahamas Synod. The council plans a mini-retreat in late April to consider a re-organization of church board, committees, and teams, in part to coordinate the disparate use of terms we use and to make our usage of those terms consistent with a revised church constitution. More importantly, the Council will be reconsidering the church organization in light of current needs and the redevelopment program.

On the Sunday after Easter, the Adult Forum will start a new series with the study of the book, *Becoming the Answer to our Prayers: Prayer for Ordinary Radicals*, by Shane Clairborne and Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove. A focus of the book is that "Prayer is not so much about convincing God to do what we want God to do as it is about convincing ourselves to do what God wants us to do." Sandy Bauldree will be the principal leader, with Dan Norford as a back-up. We will look at chapter one for the first Sunday, at 9 a.m.

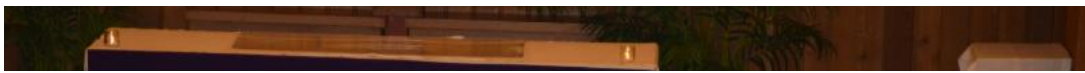

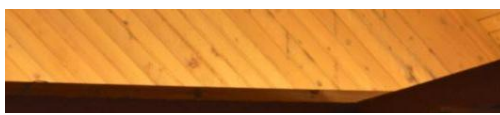

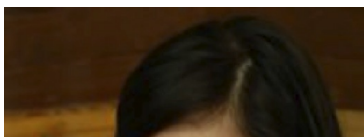

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## Where are they now? Johnalyn Gordon

She is now a Master's Student in Urban Entomology at the Fort Lauderdale Research and Education Center, University of Florida, Davie, Florida. ## Women in Ag: Johnalyn Gordon

What started as a childhood interest of "creepy crawly critters" from her back yard has transformed into a field of study and future career for Johnalyn Gordon.

Gordon is currently a master's student studying entomology and nematology at the UF/IFAS College of Agricultural and Life Sciences (CALS). As a CALS student, Gordon's proudest moment came from the very first time she was able to develop and implement a research project. The thrill she had from that experience inspired her to pursue a career as a scientist.

"I am excited to work in a field that has such a direct application to people's lives and property," Gordon said. "My ultimate goal is to apply what I have learned during my time as a graduate student to make a positive contribution to and impact on the urban and industrial pest management industry. I wanted to somehow channel my passion into an applied field of study that could directly benefit people and the environment. Fortunately, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences offered me just that!"

Through a course titled "Bugs and People" and the help from her professor, Rebecca Baldwin, Gordon was hired as a laboratory technician with the UF/IFAS entomology and nematology department. This position enabled her to run experiments and participate in the research design portion of projects.

Gordon mentioned the UF/IFAS entomology and nematology department seems to have equal representation of men and women among the students, faculty, and staff. She did share her concerns about potentially not being taken seriously in the pest management field because of her youth and gender.

"Certainly the pest management field tends to be largely comprised of men, especially in terms of the pest management professionals," Gordon said. "However, in my experience, almost everyone I have come in contact with have been very helpful and willing to offer valuable insights on how to be successful in the field."

In addition to the role model that Baldwin has been, Gordon also credits several other researchers as being inspirational women in the field of entomology and nematology. "Many of the women that I've heard speak at conferences and symposiums have been inspirations," Gordon said. "They demonstrated that women are just as capable as men in the field of biological sciences. The women I saw are successful researchers that are highly respected, and this is something I aspire to be."

For other women working in the fields of agricultural and life sciences, Gordon provides encouragement, motivation and even a challenge.

"[Do not] let gender stereotypes hold you back when it comes to the field of agricultural and life sciences," Gordon said. "Let your passion be the navigator, not society's mold. Women can get dirt on their hands, can pick up snakes and insects, can be a technical director of a pest control company, can be the principal investigator of a laboratory - you name it! You don't have to change yourself in any way. You can rock your favorite lipstick or wear a dress, you don't have to dial down your femininity to be in the field you are passionate about."

That was me? Is me? Well, fancy that...who knew? It was a humbling experience.

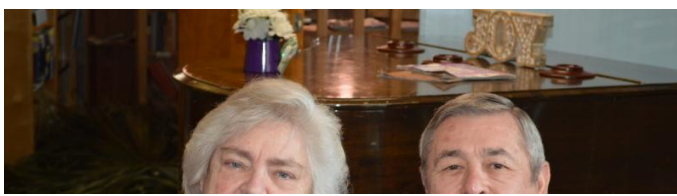

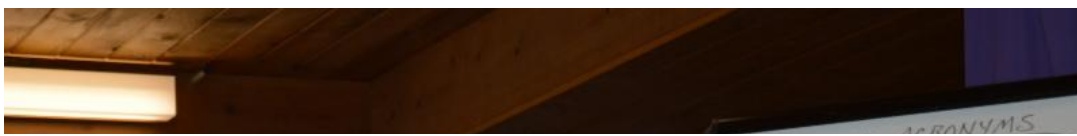

The tables were beautifully decorated with green tablecloths and centerpieces for the March 8 LIFT pot-luck luncheon, an early St. Patrick's Day reminder. As usual, the food was ample and delicious.

Joan Anderson was our speaker, and she presented a program, as announced, on "Community Connections" focusing on issues of immigration. She reminded us of ways members of our congregation have participated in many forms of outreach to the hungry and homeless and other people in need in our own community as well.







Specifically regarding immigrants, both documented and undocumented, Joan listed several initiatives where some UELC members are involved. She herself is a link to most of them, and anyone wishing to inquire about being involved can contact her. Joan previously had given an evening presentation on February 20 at our church about "Baker Interfaith Friends", a Ministry of Presence, visiting immigrants in detention at the Baker County Detention Facility. Attendees at that presentation included members of our church and other Gainesville churches, and some with no church affiliation.

Other organizations and coalitions offering friendship and services to immigrants, as well as newcomers from other countries, include Welcoming Gainesville and Welcoming Alachua County. (You see their yard signs around the city.) Also Gainesville Interfaith Alliance for Immigrant Justice, and local participation in the National Farm Workers Movement (supporting seasonal migrant workers). ULC members in the past contributed recipes to a Thrivent Fundraiser of the Gainesville chapter, to raise money to print one thousand Spanish language Resource Guides for the Rural Women's Health Project.

Joan emphasized that there are ways to help, involving time and no great financial outlay. Drivers are needed to get migrant workers to free medical services, such as a one-day dental clinic at Santa Fe College. The Rural Women's Health Project also collects socks, and money for Walmart medical prescription cards.

Lastly, a way to be involved is through advocacy. In particular, Joan spoke about the Dream Act of 2017, which she details elsewhere in this Lampstand. Many attendees at the March 8 LIFT, signed a petition to our two state senators and our congressional representative, or wrote their own letters, asking them to vote for this act. More UELC members signed petitions during the Fellowship time after worship on the following Sunday.

If you are free midday on the second Thursday of each month, and not already attending LIFT, you should consider joining us. It is a time to catch up with UELC friends, and always learn something new and interesting on a variety of subjects.

## DREAM Act

**Thank you** to the 24 people who signed letters in support of the DREAM ACT of 2017, to three legislators, Nelson, Rubio, and Yoho. The letters were sent by certified mail in mid-March.

The DREAM (**D**evelopment, **R**elief, and **E**ducation for **A**lien **M**inors) Act is a strong, bi-partisan effort that includes a reasonable path to citizenship (8 to 13 years to eligibility) for

undocumented immigrants in the U.S. The bill as introduced contains no provisions that expand border militarization, detentions, and deportations.

The intent is that reform policies should address the factors that drive people to flee their home countries. What desperate situations cause people to uproot their families? Congress should prioritize funding to reduce food insecurity and violence in other countries, rather than investing in further militarization of the border.

Please continue to work for justice with **your pen and your prayers!** There is no excess of these.
