President's Message

A special new year's greeting to each of you!

I have inherited this space from Krissi Norford because the new Church Council--in desperation or a lapse of good judgment, or perhaps both--have elected me your congregational president for 2018.

I first want to pause to reflect on the successes of our faith community during the last year and the potential and challenges for the next.

The most important success was the calling of an ELCA pastor, Pastor Terrance Jacobs, an experienced ELCA redeveloper and a former Director for Evangelical Mission. He has inspired our church life and provided effective leadership for the Church Council and church staff. He also started the process of reinvigorating our Campus Ministry. Meanwhile, our cash on hand has increased to \$93,000 for the congregation and \$85,000 for campus ministry (remember that we did not have to pay salaries for a complete year for a pastor, or music minister and will have expenses related to redevelopment, and need to provide more mission funding as a part of redevelopment agreement; and that campus ministry has not been operating anywhere near full scale but has started to invest in significant improvements in the Kaiser Center and other projects that will appeal to students). Church pledging has risen by about 20 percent for 2018.

We added Evelyn Simmons as our church secretary, JiHye Han as our Minister of Music, and Tyler Stovall as our apartment resident. We want to thank them, and accountant, Margaret McKinley, and custodian, Joshua Gordon, for their service.

Our congregational president of the last year, Krissi Norford, deserves a lot of credit for guiding us through four hires, our on and off relationship with the Alive! church, and the oversight of too many transactions and challenges to mention. Krissi will be our vice president this year. Jim Yale deserves singling out for his unsung but hard work as treasurer and financial secretary for the year and agreeing to do it again for 2018. Stephanie Jahn deserves special mention for serving as our secretary and Vibeke Vala as the council

member who will replace her. Our other council members are Janet Janke, Jackie Klein, Ron Gordon and Donna Day.

We owe a debt of gratitude to Shari O'Brien, who has worked closely with our interim pastors to maintain as healthy a ministry as we could. She was asked to help do many things while we looked for a permanent pastor developer, things she did faithfully even when they were difficult for her. Our board chairs for the last year have been Shari, campus ministry; Martin Vala, property; Caroline Yale, hospitality; Peter Fauerbach, worship; and Liz Finn (with Shari) for education and outreach. Martin Vala deserves special credit for property improvements negotiated through agreements with the city.

Special thanks also go to Anna Grace MontMarquette and much of her family for managing our church's football parking, from which we derive substantial revenue. Gene Reyerson and Sabrina Little did our internal audits this year. Andy Noss edited the *Lampstand* and worked with Rick Dienhart to pull together our annual report, something the two of them have done the last few years. Of course, our ever-willing Sam Brill served as the church's unofficial photographer. Stephan Jahn and Vibeke Vala worked on our website.

Special thanks go to Amy Schirmer and Pat Dasler for their leadership in Family Promise, and to Janet Janke, Joan Anderson, and Andy Noss for their leadership in social justice programs.

Thanks go to all of you who have contributed to the worship service. Thanks go to the members of the hospitality and property teams, those who led aspects of our education program, others who contributed to committee activities, and to our office angels.

I hope those I didn't mention will forgive me for erring on the side of recognizing as many as I could. I believe recognizing contributions to our community when possible is important. At the same time, we are at a stage in the life of our church where most of us as individuals need to continue to contribute and, at the same time, be prepared as a collective to make significant changes as we commit to redevelopment. We are in the early stages of redevelopment. We have nowhere near the money it would take to pay a full-time pastor on our own. We have not funded many of our ministry programs recently. We need to increase our benevolence commitment to the synod. I suspect we will need to change the focus of many aspects of our ministry.

We don't really know exactly what redevelopment means—and change is never easy, particularly for a congregation with as many members above 60 years of age as we do. Pastor Jacob came to us as an instrument of change. Before he came, in preparing for the redevelopment process, we were told that we could not expect to get where we wanted to go by doing what we have done in the past. This Christmas Eve, Pastor Jacob preached a sermon that emphasized the "edginess" of Mary, Joseph, and Jesus. Mary and Joseph didn't do the expected as a young unmarried couple with a baby on the way. Jesus challenged the order of the time. On Christmas Eve, our congregation sang the traditional hymns, experienced marvelous special music, and lighted our candles during "Silent Night." But the Christmas message had an "edge" to it. I couldn't help but wonder how that "edginess" might relate to our redevelopment, something I suspect will be clearer in the next year.

All of this should give us pause \dots some anxiety. \dots an energy we are already beginning to feel \dots and hope. And we know we won't be going there alone.


