
UELC's Mission:

the four emphases of Rn. Eaton. We have held Holden Evening Draver and Soun Sunners

during Wednesdays in Lent, alternating between our churches each week. Last Fall, we had a joint service and march declaring "Love, not Hate!" on God's Work Our Hands Sunday in response to the presence of "white supremacists" at UF. We have also collaborated on the housing support program, "Family Promise". Pastor Chad and I have exchanged pulpits. We have done Theology of Tap, or Beer and Hymns at the local Bar every month.

Jesus calls us to be witnesses of the Gospel saying, "You will receive power after the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth." Acts 1:8

In order to be effective witnesses, we need to be clear that we are church - not just another social club or non-profit; we are Lutheran - with our particular stress on God's Grace and not works; we are church together - we are called into Christ's community as the Body of Our Lord; and that we are church for the sake of the world - not simply to enjoy the benefits of grace, but to share that grace with all people. As the ELCA, as the Florida-Bahamas Synod and as the ELCA presence in Gainesville, we do our best to faithfully heed the call of the Gospel with these emphases.

However, it is so easy as a congregation to focus on being church together simply as a congregation. While that is good, Jesus expects more! So as Gethsemane goes into transition, let's continue to collaborate for the sake of the mission of God in Gainesville, making every effort to walk "hand in hand" - we are church together!

President's Message

While attention will continue to remain on some property issues in June, congregation members need to be aware of a temporary shift in personnel responsibilities for June.

Jeanne will be serving as church secretary this month while Evelyn is on medical leave during June. Beginning June 18, any matters regarding the church property or administration of church affairs that you would ordinarily call to the attention of the Pastor should be directed to me. For any pastoral concerns or emergencies, please contact Jeanne as she will direct them as relevant, to available pastors per Pastor Jacob's guidance.

Those working on the sound system in the sanctuary continue to resolve our church sound issues. During the week following May 20, when we lost sound in the middle of the service, a new unit was installed in the system as the old unit had suffered wear and tear over the years. So from May 27 the sound is better than it has been in a long time. We are grateful to all those who volunteered their time and money to respond to the problem. That new unit, plus the new microphones on order, should give us more stable sound unless, as Martin Vala says, new "gremlins have taken up residence" in the system.

Andy Finn is gathering quotations for both short-term and long-term fixes on the roofs both in the sanctuary and in the Kaiser Center. In the meanwhile, members who at the church, and who have keyed access to various parts of our building, are asked to empty the buckets of water and mop the floor if they are on the church campus after a rain.

In another property matter, Sam Borgert has been authorized to order and install the vinyl plank waterproof flooring to replace all carpeting in the Kaiser Center with the exception of the education wing, for now. The congregation will be updated on progress of this upgrade which was planned over a year ago when funds from the Campus Ministry budget was allocated for this purpose. These funds were mostly raised from the rental of parking spots for games throughout the year. This project started with the upgrade on the bathrooms in the Kaiser Center and will later include an upgrade on the furnishings in the fellowship area.



ELCA International Women's Leadership, Student Scholar Cecilia Nakunda Mshana from Tanzania

Amid all the other ELCA outreach projects and funding drives, you may well have missed the ELCA International Women's Leadership Student Scholar Award program. This is a select and prestigious award given to young women from overseas partner churches to attend ELCA colleges and universities in the US.

Phil and I are excited to have a close personal connection to a just-named young woman recipient from an ELCA partner church in Tanzania, Cecilia Nkunda Mshana. She is one of three daughters of Mary and Pastor Frank Mshana, and will be attending St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota in the fall. Though Tanzanian, her mother Mary has a degree in Christian Business Management from a university in Kenya. She has been, and still is, director of Pangani Lutheran Children's Center (PLCC) in Nairobi, Kenya. This is a project serving girls from the streets and slums of Nairobi. I worked there as a volunteer while we were living in Nairobi during the years 1994 - 2000, and Mary and we continue to be in regular contact. Cecilia's father is serving a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania.

Under Mary's wise leadership, PLCC continues to offer assistance to an increasing number of girls with expanding facilities and programs year after year. Orientation classes are given to girls who come into the program with no formal education. They are provided with uniforms, school supplies, meals, social activities and involvement with the Kenya Evangelical Lutheran Church for the primary grades. After primary school, some girls go on to get vocational

training. Those who qualify to go on for higher academic education are funded by sponsorships or helped to get scholarships. PLCC is supported by income-generating projects in Nairobi, and by individual donors and congregations in the US, Germany and Sweden. Volunteers from these countries also work alongside the Kenyan staff.

It has not been easy for Mary and Frank to follow their respective Christian vocations, as they frequently have had to live separately in neighboring countries. So we are delighted that Cecilia, by her own outstanding academic and personal achievements, will be able to continue her education at St. Olaf. Northfield is only a little over an hour away from where our daughter Katie and her family live in Rochester, Minnesota, and that family is already looking forward to having a African "daughter" nearby. Grandson Wesley is a student at the other college in Northfield, Carleton College, so they also will have occasions to get acquainted.

We are pleased to **announce** that Baker Interfaith Friends has been awarded a grant from Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) to provide visitation and supportive services to individuals and families currently in, or recently released from, immigration detention.



Volunteers with Baker Interfaith Friends come from at least nine different churches and others in the Gainesville community. It is a great opportunity to work together with people from different faith communities. Last summer several members of UELC joined in the visitation venture. We would **welcome** volunteers for any of our regular visits, 2nd and 4th Mondays of every month. Please contact Joan Anderson to learn more or to volunteer.

Please **pray** for mercy and strength for several we have been visiting who are seeking asylum from various African countries and are fearing for their lives if they are deported. Pray for the safety of their families as well.

The first book is a collection of short stories: <u>Immigrant Voices - 21st Century Stories</u>, Edited by Achy Obejas and Megan Bayles (The Great Books Foundation). World Refugee Day - June 20, 2018

"When things fall apart, the children of the land scurry and scatter like birds escaping a burning sky. They flee their own wretched land so their hunger may be pacified in foreign lands, their tears wiped away in strange lands, the wounds of their despair bandaged in

THIS YEAR IS DIFFERENT a time when the number of refugees has increased worldwide, the U.S. has reduced the number of refugees that will be welcomed here to the lowest number since 1980. Moreover, actual resettlements have been about half the number promised.

Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) reported in April, "Something terrible is happening. Canopy Northwest Arkansas - LIRS's newest partner in refugee resettlement - is scheduled to receive 75 refugees this year. It even knows 40 of them by name. But so far, no refugees have rejoined their families or set foot in their new homes because of chokeholds in the refugee admission process." So Canopy raised the money to take 20 people of faith, to Washington, D.D., to speak with their members of Congress. They want to know, 'Where are our families?'"

THIS YEAR ADD YOUR VOICE. Find a time during the week of June 18-22, to call the U.S. Capitol switchboard: (202) 224-3121. Ask to be connected to the office of Representative Yoho, Senator Nelson, and Senator Rubio (three calls). Tell them you are calling from Gainesville. Communicate your concerns and <u>urge them to do everything in their power to see that the administration resettles at least the 45,000 refugees that were set as the cap for 2018. Tell them you encourage and support a commitment to resettle at least 75,000 refugees for 2019.</u>

We have the resources, we have the will, we have the imperative to speak out in support of refugees, as People of Faith called to welcome the stranger and as Americans honoring a legacy.
