

President's Message

What a blessing we are all receiving from the Holden services during Lent and the music program being provided by JiHye Han and Crystal Jacob! Pastor Jacob is also working hard with Andy Finn and Martin Vala to provide a working sound system.

In March we will celebrate the blessings of the long-time ministry of Deacon Shari O'Brien and engage in a few new ministry initiatives. The appreciation program for Shari's multi-faceted ministry will begin with a potluck after church on Palm Sunday, March 25, and will include a few speakers and a couple of surprises. Jackie Klein is helping me coordinate the program.

Just before this issue of the *Lampstand* was published, however, the congregational council began an initiative to reach out to congregational members who have not often been seen recently. Council members will individually check to see how members are doing and whether there is anything the church can do to help them or whether they are ready to be more active as the church engages in renewal. The effort will also serve to help update the congregational membership roster as required by the synod.

The church Council in February adopted plans to enhance the security of congregational members in addition to the enhanced parking lot lighting already authorized. Cece Noss has written an article elsewhere in this newsletter summarizing a recent program of LIFT, when Ray Davis assessed our church buildings' security. Ray reviewed materials provided by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security letting people know what to do to prepare for, and protect ourselves, in the case of an outside shooter situation. Materials handed out at LIFT will be made available to all members of the congregation, and congregational members will be given an opportunity to inform themselves of what to do if we should face an active shooter situation in our church. Church leaders will work with local law enforcement officials to development a protocol for our congregation in the case of a crisis.

While congregational leaders do not expect an active shooter situation in one of our buildings, we recognize our location and activism might make us a target. After hearing about the presentations of Davis and Bill Phoule, who specializes in personal protection, at LIFT, the Council voted against an armed presence on the UELC campus. An armed presence often antagonizes a person who has a mindset to shoot, and it is difficult to prepare for the armament a shooter might bring. A shootout between a bad guy and "good guys" risks too many lives in a crowd. Both alarm systems and armed security officers are expensive and often an ineffective way to rebuff an attack. Davis, Phoule, and Homeland Security recommend running if possible, hiding in a secured location if possible, and fighting en masse or with any object available only as last alternative. Most importantly, experts recommend using cell phones to call 911, calls which are monitored every Sunday morning by law enforcement units in the area.

The Council also heard reports from Vibeke Vala and Pastor Jacob on the development of a Sanctuary Congregation at Westminster Presbyterian Church. The program is still in the development stage, and no candidates for sanctuary have been identified. The Pastor encouraged interested congregational members to participate in the Interfaith Alliance for Immigrant Just (IAIJ), which meets Mondays at the local Mennonite church. Joan Anderson attends regularly.

Pastor Jacob announced that Vibeke Vala will head a new church website initiative. She is working with a team that includes the pastor, Janet Janke, Andy Noss, and me. In order to allow Vibeke to lead the website effort, Ron Gordon and Krissi Norford have agreed to help her with the minutes.

LIFT: Protecting Your Church Congregations--Tips for Improving Safety

Thirty-five people were in attendance at the February LIFT. As usual, the food was plentiful and delicious. The two invited speakers spoke on security issues. The recent mass shooting

at the Parkland, Florida high school, is yet another tragic example of a killer with a "soft target". "Soft targets" are where innocent people are gathered in places of learning, celebrating, worshipping, never expecting violence. This is why we need to become more informed.

The first speaker, Ray Davis, is a retired GPD Police Sergeant. Much of what he said about our church property was reassuring. He told the group that, before speaking, he had made the rounds of our buildings and property, and gave them high marks. He found them very secure, both outside and inside. The walls, doors and windows are heavy and offer good protection, and there are multiple entries and exists to both the sanctuary building and the Kaiser Center. The pews inside the sanctuary are heavy. As for the Kaiser Center, he noted that the doors on the offices are heavy, open outward (therefore more of a barrier to forced entry), and equipped with locks. He said the outside lighting was good. This was without knowing that Martin Vala reported in the Annual Report that purchase and installation of new solar-powered LED street lights on new poles are planned to replace the flood lights which will come down when the old utility poles are removed as part of the Northwest First Avenue renovation.

Mr. Davis told us that the GPD has a policy for their vehicles to cruise near churches on Sunday mornings, watching for anything that looks suspicious. He also said, when someone makes a 911 call about a dangerous situation, the caller needs to be patient and stay on the line when giving the location and other details, because the dispatcher is typing all the information into a computer which is received by all law enforcement vehicles operating in the city. The closest vehicles can respond very quickly.

Both speakers said we all should be aware of our surroundings wherever we are, and mentally have a plan in case there is an incident. Current advice is to flee or hide if you are able. If you are hiding, turn off your cell phone ring. If things are evolving quickly, do whatever you can to distract the attacker, throwing something at (presumably) him, or several individuals jumping on him at the same time. When law enforcement arrives, make sure your hands are empty and visible. During all this, we are advised to try to stay calm and not panic.

The second speaker was Bill Phoule. He is a former Marine, former member of a Swat team, and had been on teams offering protection to high-profile figures such as Colin Powell and Condoleezza Rice when they traveled. He also runs personal defense training workshops. Consequently, he has been thinking about security and protection issues all of his adult life.

His talk touched on a wide range of personal protection issues. He said that criminals who want to make a lot of money with little risk of being caught, favor identity theft. The highest two target groups for identity theft are seniors and children, children because criminals can use their social security numbers to establish credit to make purchases, and no one is checking for breaches. As for adults, never give out personal information such as social security numbers or bank account numbers to a phone caller, no matter who the caller claims to represent, unless you have initiated the call. For home security, he suggested considering motion detector lights on the outside of your home, and also home alarm systems.

When you are in public places, always be alert to your surroundings and anything which seems strange or suspicious. He does not advise going to Walmart at night, parking at a distance from the store in an area with less lighting, and walking to the store while checking your cell phone! He warns ladies not to put their purses in shopping carts while inside stores. Would-be robbers will look for the easiest targets.


As for possible attempts at attack or abduction, Mr. Phoule said, in his experience, it isn't the potential victim's physical strength or training which has prevented a bad outcome, but it was in their quick thinking. For example, if someone is trying to force you into a car, make a lot of noise, draw attention, and at all costs do not get in a car with an abductor.

Being aware of possible risks and vulnerabilities, and having mental plans for how to deal with anything from a petty robber to a mass shooter, should make us feel more, not less, secure. Thank you to these speakers, and to the organizers.
