Five Minutes



When I asked us all to consider a New Year's resolution to spend five minutes alone with God in prayer and reflection, most people looked at

me strangely. One look seemed to say, "Are we going to be like **those** Christians now? You know, those legalistic types." I'm not one for religious vows and forced rituals, as they quickly become meaningless, but when our intentions are simply to develop a deeper relationship with Jesus and not to "check off" some list of chores, we just might get somewhere; "somewhere" in our quest to be more like the Gospel asks us to be. Some had the look that said, "Only five minutes!" With most New Year's resolutions, we become so ambitious and we think that our enthusiasm itself will make us fulfil it. But lo and behold, each New Year's Eve we lament not having accomplished the resolutions we made for that year. In a fast paced world, even five minutes seems like a long time to wait. Today, we pace impatiently in front of the microwave and get impatient with the coffee maker – even the guick Keurig is not fast enough.

So, I am asking us to be more realistic. Spend five minutes alone with Jesus every evening. Start by reading a short piece of scripture; reflect on the relevance of that for your life; then think about today and what you can be thankful for, as well as what you may need to ask forgiveness for; then, think about tomorrow and how you can be a witness of the gospel; ask God's help to be that witness; then just pray for whatever is on your mind, remembering to be thankful, confessing and offering prayers for others and yourself. We did exactly that exercise during Advent Evening Prayer last month. Let's resolve to do just that all year in 2019! If you have your "Quiet time" in the morning, then use the above by replacing "today" with yesterday and "tomorrow" with today. Have a Blessed New Year!



Village of Hope in Haiti educates over 650 students. Last year 97% of their graduates passed the required national exams, which is more than twice the national average in Haiti.

Other accomplishments this past year include expanding classes for computer science, music, science, and art. They now even have a small band!

The Health Center not only provide students with medical, dental, and ophthalmology care, but also the families and individuals in the villages surrounding the school. They have provided care for 21,000 adults and children this past year.

February/March is when UELC members renew their sponsorships and new sponsorships are encouraged.

The continued generosity of people living in the US ensures that the work of Village of Hope continues to be a sign of God's love in the lives of the countless people they serve.
