
UELC's Mission:

that hight. God the nory spirit so moved our hearts and worked in each of those who participated in the service, that all present said they "felt something". As Christians, we need to allow ourselves to "feel" the presence of God. Many of us are afraid to bring our whole selves into our experience of worship. For some it is fear of being vulnerable, for some it is the need to be in control, and for some it feels counter to what they were taught about our religious expression. The Spirit-led "feeling" is not manufactured, but allowed to be felt.

The week after the storm, I was on my roof clearing out branches that had fallen, when I heard the frantic chirping of birds in the tree above. I had learned as a child, that I should take notice of that frantic chirping of



the birds as there may be a predator around. Low and behold, as I looked up, I saw a huge owl calmly perched on the tree. It was a sight to behold! I was amazed at the awesome scene, that I felt invited into. The owl looked down on me. The other birds looked little next to this huge owl, as some of them swarmed around her. Even the bright red, energetic cardinal did not cause the great owl to flinch. The owl sat there for over an hour, allowing me to take pictures (one shared above) and letting me get on with my work. The little birds gave up their cackling, as if to acknowledge that the owl was not intending to harm them. They seemed to feel secure, as did I.

I connected the grim - almost morose - liturgy of the Good Friday Service that captured the import of the grim crucifixion of Jesus, with the experience of the birds with this owl, and I marveled. I had been invited into both these in a special way. So I found myself thinking about the words of a hymn: "Behind a frowning providence, He hides a smiling face...", better known for its title and first line, God moves in a mysterious way; His wonders to perform (William Cowper 1774):

> Judge not the Lord by feeble sense, But trust Him for His grace; Behind a frowning providence He hides a smiling face.

Hats off to HAT





A Guide to Bible Translation



A new book, *A Guide to Bible Translation: People, Languages, and Topics*, has just been published by United Bible Societies, headquarters in Swindon, England, and Xulon Press of Maitland, Florida. The coeditors are Philip Noss (retired from United Bible Societies) and Charles S. Houser (retired from the American Bible Society). This volume of over 1000 pages contains articles by 180 Bible translators and scholars from around the world. It represents ten years of concerted effort, and even more years of experience and research by the contributors. It is not a "How to translate the Bible" manual. Rather, each of the three sections comprises many short and some longer entries. The first part gives biographies of individuals through the ages who have made significant contributions to Bible translation. The second section tells the histories and stories of many different Bible translations. The third and largest section contains articles about topics of significance in Bible translation, the challenges facing Bible translators in the past and present and the choices they have to make to render the result accurate, understandable and

acceptable to the people for whom they are translating. Examples include anthropomorphism (giving God human qualities); the Tower of Babel; translating rituals, prophecy, poetry, blessings and curses; suggestions for translating words and concepts unfamiliar culturally or geographically to the readership;

translating for blind or deaf audiences; translating for modern media, and many, many more.

This book will be useful for Bible translators, those aspiring to be Bible translators, students, clergy, and laypersons engaged in serious Bible study. The list price is \$61.49 for the soft back version, \$71.99 for hardback, and \$9.99 as an eBook. It is available from Xulon Press, and soon will be posted on Amazon and available as well from Barnes and Noble and Christian bookstores. Royalties will go to the United Bible Societies to support its ongoing work.
