
UELC's Mission:

A Fall Lens: What do we Need to Shed?



Shedding is a natural process of change when it comes to creation. Generally Autumn (Fall) is the season of shedding. Many trees and plants shed their leaves. Many animals change their habits during changing seasons. Some creatures have periodic times of molting - shedding old skin or their coat. Frogs, moths and butterflies undergo a complete





skin or their coat. Frogs, moths and butterflies undergo a complete change from their first form in a process called metamorphosis. For them too, shedding is inevitable and, actually necessary for their survival.

When we go through the different passages of life as humans, we have to shed something each time. Whether it is shedding our puppy fat as we become teens; shedding our dependence on parents as we become

adults; shedding much of our independence to share our lives with a partner; shedding our focus on ourselves as a couple as we have children; letting go of our children as they transition to adulthood and independence; letting go of our tendency to control as we ourselves lose some abilities as we age; letting go of a spouse, siblings or parents as they pass on from this world; shedding our independence to a larger extent as we grow old and frail. Shedding is a necessary part of life. **When we fail to accept shedding and transition, our development is stunted or skewed.** We cause problems for ourselves and all those around us and, often, society as a whole. Change is inevitable and necessary for our survival.

Shedding is a process of adapting to a changing environment. It is seeking to remain vital, often in a new form, depending on changed conditions. It is finding stability through creative redefinition/ redevelopment / rebirth. It's also the change process in the Church.



As Church, we have constantly been changing to remain vital with changing contexts. Seeking vitality and relevance is an integral part of who we are. The three circles in the above diagram are what we aim for as healthy change. In essence we maintain our identity, as do trees and much of nature. As there are some basic characteristics that define human beings, even through the passages of life, similarly, there are basic characteristics of being church – identifying marks. For example, we remain the Body of Christ, a Christ-Centered community for the Means of Grace (Word, Baptism and Eucharist - in the Lutheran tradition). We maintain our creedal beliefs. Then, beyond our basic identity, we adapt to changing times in the way we express this identity.

Records of the histories and descriptions of the Church's changing expressions and form are exhaustive and date back from the first century AD to today. I will not attempt to cover that in this article (thank God) but call on us to focus on just ONE change that is simple yet proving to be more difficult than it should be, especially in churches of European descent: Evangelism. Before we run with fear for all that word conjures up, let me limit

this to a basic act: Inviting. In our history, simply being welcoming or even being present, was seen as enough to fulfil our role as a Community for the Means of Grace. As Lutheran we have also seen our social outreach to those in need as a way of welcoming people and being a witness in the world. In this type of outreach, we have not focused intentionally on inviting people to our church community to receive the Means of Grace and to develop a sibling relationship with us in Christ.

So, let us shed our aversion to, fear of, or even resistance to Evangelism, and simply invite someone to church. Andrew met Jesus and knew He was the Messiah, so he felt he had to invite his brother Peter to meet Jesus. (John 1:40-41). Philip invited Nathaniel, who was skeptical, but Philip simply said, "Come and see for yourself. (John 1:45-46). Andrew took Peter to see Jesus. We all can invite and bring people to church. Philip faced scientism, like we do today, so we do not have to try to convince anyone. Like Philip and Andrew, simply invite others. Then, as in the case of Peter and Nathaniel – the invitees – Jesus did the calling. **Jesus does the calling, but we invite people to experience "the means of grace" at our church worship services.** Let's shed yesterday's habits, even yesterday's characteristics (how we express our identity). INVITE someone to church – a relative, a friend, a colleague or an acquaintance. This is ONE step towards our shedding this Fall.

Family Promise

Excitement and joyful tears marked the recent Fall fundraising luncheon of Family Promise of Gainesville. The family headed by Rachel and Matthew, who, along with their 5-year old daughter, stayed with us earlier this year, learned in front of the attendees that they had won a new house donated directly to them from Clayton Homes, a mobile home manufacturer! Clayton asked Family Promise chapters nationwide to nominate families to vie for one of three homes they would provide, transport and fit onto a mobile home park of the winner's choosing. A lengthy application was required and had to meet many criteria. You might have heard or seen Rachel and Matthew interviewed on local TV and radio after hearing the incredible news. If you don't remember them, you can return to the April 2019 Lampstand newsletter which published a very moving letter of gratitude which they wrote for all host congregations. The letter tells their long and arduous journey before finding Family Promise. Rachel works at Grace Marketplace and was just given a promotion. Matt works at Jiffy Lube, and continues to help FP families with car repairs as needed.



A second point of celebration was the incredible generosity of attendees and supporters who helped FP reach its hefty goal of \$20,000, a commitment that had to be met by the end of the year to comply with a grant won earlier in the year for the new program, 'Help Us Move In'. This program, which has helped 50 people, including children, just since August, focuses on eviction prevention for families in eminent danger of losing their housing, and to help rehouse families by providing money for move-in expenses, such as deposits.

It is humbling to see the generous gifts people and companies have given to this blessed mission!

It is also humbling for me to unite our congregation's resources in order to affect families' lives so directly by providing wholesome food and shelter to families at UELC. **We will host families next week, Oct. 6-13.** Please contact me if you'd like to be involved.
